Diocese of Newark Elects XI Bishop by nina nicholson, diocesan director of communications



The Rev. Carlye J. Hughes was chosen XI Bishop of the Diocese of Newark during a special convention on May 19, 2018 at St. Peter's Episcopal Church in Morristown.

The first woman and first African -American to be elected bishop in the Diocese of Newark, Hughes, 59, is currently rector of <u>Trinity Episcopal Church</u> in Fort Worth, TX, the <u>Diocese of Fort Worth</u>, and was one of three nominees.

In order to be elected, a candidate needed to receive a simple majority of votes from both the clergy and the lay delegates, voting separately as orders in the same balloting round. Hughes was elected on the first ballot, receiving 62 of 116 clergy votes and 141 of 241 lay votes.

The other two nominees were:

The Rev. Lisa W. Hunt, rector of St. Stephen's Episcopal Church, Houston, TX in the Diocese of Texas The Rev. Canon Scott G. Slater, Canon to the Ordinary in the Diocese of Maryland.


Addressing the assembly via live video from Fort Worth, Hughes said, "I am absolutely overjoyed and delighted that you have elected me to be the next bishop of Newark. It is with a humble and thankful heart that I accept those election results and welcome the gift of being your bishop."

After thanking the Search, Transition and Standing committees for their work, she said, "I am really aware that moments like this do not come in a vacuum. It takes a village to discern a call to the episcopacy, and it is the generous and fruitful ministries of Bishop Beckwith, the Rev. Lisa Hunt, the Rev. Canon Scott Slater, the congregations and people of the Diocese of Newark, and the people of Trinity Episcopal Church in Fort Worth, Texas who have opened the door for us to be in ministry together, and for that I am deeply grateful." Hughes was ordained a priest in 2005 after graduating from Virginia Theological Seminary, and has served as rector of Trinity Episcopal Church in the continuing Diocese of Fort Worth since 2012. No stranger to the northeast, her first call was to St. James' Church on Manhattan's Upper East Side. Before ordination, she worked as a corporate trainer. She is married to David Smedley. More about Bishop-elect Hughes.

Pending consent of a majority of the bishops with jurisdiction and the diocesan standing committees, Hughes will be ordained and consecrated September 22, 2018, at the New Jersey Performing Arts Center in Newark. Presiding Bishop Michael Curry will preside.

Four decades after my two-year sojourn in Japan, where I lived after college, I still draw wisdom from Zen koans. As the Diocese of Newark continues to be in discernment in preparation for electing its next bishop this coming Saturday, a particular koan stands out:

> Nan-in, a Japanese master during the Meiji era (1868-1912), received a university professor who came to inquire about Zen. Nan-in served tea. He poured his visitor's cup full, and then kept on pouring.

> The professor watched the overflow until he no longer could restrain himself. "It is overfull. No more will go in!" "Like this cup," Nan-in said, "you are full of your own opinions and speculations. How can I show you Zen unless you first empty your cup?"

Since the candidate walkabouts from May 4-6, people across the diocese have literally been sharing notes, engaging in conversations, viewing the video of candidates Lisa Hunt, Carlye Hughes and Scott Slater taken on May 5, and sorting through answers and opinions. All of that is important and necessary.

And so is emptying the cup. In Christian terms, that means providing

space for the Holy Spirit to breathe into our souls. To set aside time to flush out the anxiety – or at least let it drain a bit; to give our active minds a rest, to let go of the pressure to make a decision – and simply be in God's presence. Emptying the cup does not necessarily result in an answer (although some will say that it does), but it opens up the possibility for greater clarity so that one has a better chance of responding rather than reacting.

I had a grace-filled two hours with Lisa, Carlye and Scott before they made their presentations to the diocese. We weren't able to empty our cups in the conversation we had together – there was information to be passed on by me and many questions to be asked by them. But they each told me that they had done some serious emptying in the process that led them to become a candidate for bishop.

Before the bishop election, take time to "empty the cup"


There was something rather special about the dinner this time. First there was the dish itself – Beef Stroganoff – a little different with its suggestion of haute cuisine. We cared enough

Putting Love Into Action: As They Say, It Takes a Village.



My friend Addie belongs to the Bahá'í faith. While we may not hear much about it in this country's mainstream media, the Bahá'í Faith is one of the youngest of the world's major religions. It was founded by Baha'u'llah in Iran in the 19th century and is established today in more than 100,000 localities in virtually every country and territory around the world. I recently saw some photos on Addie's Facebook page of her and some friends with a number of young children. Since I don't always see her posts, I was curious and asked her what she was up to. Here's what she revealed:

"I've been tutoring refugees for the last few years so most of them are from my English as a second language class. But in the last year, I've become very close to one refugee family that came from the Congo with

six children. They were in a refugee camp in Tanzania for 21 years where their children were born and raised until they came to Las Vegas. So their language is Swahili (which I happen to speak because I was in the Peace Corps 30 years ago in a Swahili-speaking country). Anyway, this family has needed a lot of help and we've become very close. And through them. I've also met a beautiful family from Eritrea. They are refugees that arrived around the same time and live next door to them. So I'm working with both families pretty much all my days off ... very rewarding. Helping these friends gives me so much joy. Lots of my Bahai friends have been volunteering with them, too. So now, their successful adaptation to the U.S. has become a project for about five of us working together. As they say: it takes a village...."

And that's how Love happens. It isn't some abstract idea or a warm-and-


fuzzy feeling. Love is an action. It is living out one's faith right where we live in the everyday, using our God-given talents and compassion in the service of others. In truth, this Love is at the heart of the world's great religions.

The Most Reverend Michael Curry, Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church, preached the Power of Love as the subject of his sermon for last month's Royal Wedding of Prince Harry and Meaghan Markle. In it, he said: "Someone once said that Jesus began the most revolutionary movement in all of human history. A movement grounded in the unconditional love of God for the world. And a movement mandating people to live that love. And in so doing, to change not only their lives, but the very life of the world itself." 



