Following the Rev. Dr. Joy A. Rose's resignation at the end of November, we find ourselves again in search of a new priest in charge to share our spiritual journey. 

A Grace-filled Experience

Roberta Nobleman has just returned from a trip to Dominica, a very poor Caribbean island sandwiched between Guadeloupe and Martinique. She was visiting friends she made there 20 years ago when she sponsored a 10-year-old girl, Ressa, through the Christian Children's Fund and formed a loving, deep relationship with the whole family.

Last February one of Ressa's three brothers, Dwight, aged 32, was drowned in the Atlantic Ocean, fishing for food. Then Hurricane Maria struck. The damage to this beautiful, volcanic place was as devastating as it was in Puerto Rica, although little known here. Read Roberta's account of her trip:

"I knew I had to see my friends and condole with them. So, I went there the week of January 10th, staying first with a family I know in St Lucia, then taking the ferry via Martinique to Dominica. It was a devastating visit. Most houses are demolished; on others no roofs except for blue tarps, labeled "UNICEF"; no electricity; not much water and garbage everywhere. Those that could afford it have gone to other islands, or Canada.

"The village of Wesley, overlooking the Atlantic Ocean (where Dwight still lies) is hardly affording shelter to anyone. I stood with my friend Claire, Ressa's mother, in the ruins of Ebenezer Methodist Church and the cemetery where her mother lies and we sang 'Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing'; it was the most grace-filled experience.

Outreach: A Look Back and A Look Ahead



Annual Meeting Outreach Report

St. Luke's outreach efforts are out of proportion to its size and our beloved church has again provided much active and financial support to local organizations that provide food, encouragement and hope to the needy, young and old in our community. In particular we have supported the Center for Food Action (CFA), Englewood, Family Promise of Bergen County, Ridgewood, and Youth Consultation Services (YCS), Hackensack.

"For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to eat." — Matthew 25.

St. Luke's follows faithfully Jesus's injunction to His disciples in its consistent support of **Center for Food Action (CFA)** which does far more

than help provide food to the hungry; it also provides housing and heating assistance, as well as counseling and advocacy services.

Every second Sunday of the month the supermarket cart is full to over-flowing with nutritious food provided by our generous, caring congregation. We have given additional support to the most vulnerable, the children, by participating in CFA's Weekend Snack Pack Program. CFA has specified the required contents of the packs and, with money from St. Luke's Outreach budget, we purchase these from a wholesale club.

Every month, with a few exceptions, we put together and box 50 packs which are taken to local schools by CFA to provide essential nourishment at weekends to children who are eligible for free school lunches during the week. CFA continues its help during the summer as does our involvement. Many in the congregation participate in the assembly line and sometimes we are helped by a local family who want their children to understand the importance of giving to the less fortunate. In the course of the year, we have also made monetary donations to CFA, through a portion of our Trust fund proceeds, a special collection for

Thanksgiving dinner distribution, and, with Family Promise, a share of the collection at the Interfaith service.

We support two of Family Promise's programs: the Network and the Walkin Dinner programs. The first offers temporary housing to homeless working families in our neighborhood. Families move each week to a different congregation where they are sheltered and provided with meals, returning in the morning to the Family Center in Ridgewood where they find showers, laundry facilities, computers and counseling. Our church space is not adeguate to provide screened private areas for families but we do volunteer with other more spacious local congregations and this year, in August, we made dinner and breakfast and Linda Brescia and I stayed overnight, inhe gym at St. Joseph's in Demarest, where we hosted 2 5 month-old babies. 2 moms and a dad. Under difficult circumstance, the good spirits of all were inspiring. Together with our friends from the Savior Lutheran church in Paramus we twice hosted the Walk in Dinner in Hackensack, in May and October. Offering roughly

There is an Anglican church in the capital, Roseau, but that, too, will be devastated. Direct help is what these brave people need: barrels of food, staples only like rice and powdered milk, money sent via Western Union, generators. Barrels can be dropped off at church and picked up by Trans Caribe in West Orange, N.J.. Details to follow on ways to help.

150 hungry adults a hearty, nutritious meal, when the food must be brought to the facilities warm and ready to eat, is always a challenge, but especially so this October when we ran out of the chicken dishes before all were served. Kay and Tammy saved the day by donating a cooked chicken they had in their car. Clearly, we must rethink our menu, as well as the portions we serve, but we were told that the number of "walk-ins" has been increasing, an indication of real need even in our wealthy Bergen County.

In 2018 we will again be serving two walk-in dinners, on **Thursdays, May 24** and **October 25**. So, hold those dates to serve and, especially, to prepare a dish at home. We need more dishes! We also need suggestions as to good recipes for large numbers.

Every year members of St. Luke's become Secret Santa's to some disadvantaged children in the care of **YCS** (**Youth Consultation Services**). This year we committed to being Secret Santas to 12 teenagers, residents in one of their group homes. Twelve requests were not enough to meet the generous spirits of our congregation. Next Christmas we'll make sure more wishes are hanging from the Giving Tree!

YCS also does wonderful work throughout the year and they have been the recommended organization for some of our Trust Fund proceeds. Outreach is part and parcel of St. Luke's identity so thank you everyone!

A special thank you to Donna Sisti Louise Meyers and Maureen Bownes, who contribute so much of their time and talent to our efforts.

Having experienced the pleasure (and often relief) of sharing some outreach efforts with other congregations, my hope would be that in 2018 we could explore further possibilities of outreach sharing. Ideas anyone?



St. Luke's symbol is the ox. This may explain that he is his also patron of butchers. In art, Luke is represented by a winged ox. The ox represents the sacrificial aspect of Jesus' ministry and the wings remind us that the Gospel of Jesus Christ is to travel throughout the world.




